The Congress of Trade Unions and Staff Associations of Barbados (CTUSAB) salutes the nation as it celebrates its 51st anniversary as an independent island state.

The celebration of fifty-one years of nationhood is an achievement to be proudly acknowledged by the people of Barbados. This accomplishment has been earned through the struggles and sacrifices of working class people and the visions of our political, civil society, trade union leaders and members of the clergy.

In this year our 51st birthday, the country faces the pressures of the current economic and fiscal challenges. The labour movement is heartened at the resolve of the country to survive the challenges of the time.

In the face of glaring economic adversities and uncertainties, Barbadians have continued to demonstrate a love for country, resilience, respect for law and order, and for maintaining the political stability of the country.

Over the past fifty-one years, the island would have experienced the gravity of both economic and/or social crises.
