Law and Rules

Laws / legislation: These are meant to be followed by all citizens of the country. These are enforceable through such means as regulations, directives, orders, decrees and commands

A Bill is draft or intended legislation which is placed before the Parliament for discussion and approval.

An Act effectively becomes law, after the draft Bill has been debated and voted for by the Parliament, and approved by the Senate.

How Laws differ from Rules

The main difference between rules and laws is the consequences associated with breaking them.

Both rules and law are intended to bring about a sense of order, fair play, and safety.

Rules are more flexible and carry low end consequences

The weight of a law is much heavier than the weight of a rule.

Summary
